Topic and Guiding questions:

In the Working Groups we want to focus on the future and exchange views on the way forward towards the full realization the right to adequate food. All Working Groups will cover the same topic. The goal is to give voice to each stakeholder group and enrich the discussion by drawing on different perspectives. The discussions could be centered on the following guiding questions:

- What is needed to speed up the implementation of the right to food? In what ways the right to food was helpful in the past?
- What could an agenda for the right to food up to 2034 look like? What will it take to advance the realization of the right to food in the coming years?
- How can we as a stakeholder group make a concrete contribution?

Format:

The Working Groups last max. 60 minutes and will take place under Chatham House Rules (https://www.chathamhouse.org/about-us/chatham-house-rule). A free-flowing style of discussion is encouraged. Interventions can be based on the guiding questions at the table, or questions and comments on other participants' interventions. Participants can make their inputs freely, there is no given sequence. Each session is chaired by a designated moderator and a a short summary of the Working Group will be presented in the subsequent plenary discussion (max. 3 min).
